

J. B. DUNLAP DIES OF INJURIES REGEIVED IN **ACCIDENT ON JUNE 24**

Well Known Resident Of This City Succumbs Early Sunday Morning

At Sanitarium

J. B. Dunlap, 65, retired proprietor of a transfer business in this city, died at 12:30 o'clock Saturday morning at the Allen Sanitarium of injuries received in an automobile collision on the night of June 24. His death resulted from a fracture of the spine.

The accident which caused his fatal injuries occurred on Route 33, a mile west of Robinson, as Dunlap, O. S. Parker, Clarence Gatton and Herbert Green were returning to Robinson in Parker's sedan from the oil fields near Clay City. Parker attempted to drive around another car and collided head-on with a sedan driven by Ted Meskimen, who was accompanied by his wife and daughter, and Miss Catherine Bonnell and Miss March Granby of Porterville.

Both Dunlap and Parker were seriously injured. Dunlap was paralyzed from the waist down from his spinal injury and Parker had a badly fractured left hip, numerous cuts and bruises. Green received a severe scalp wound and Gatton escaped with minor injuries.

Mrs. Meskimen received a painful fracture of a shoulder and cuts and bruises. Meskimen had a severe head injury and numerous cuts and bruises. Their daughter, Donna Jean, escaped with minor injuries. Miss Bonnell received a fractured leg and Mis Granby had a cut on her nose.
